I COULD BE A... professional writer, media and public relations officer, journalist, editor, publisher, content manager, communications specialist, researcher, speech writer.


I COULD WORK IN... publishing and editing, communications, journalism, government, human resources, public relations, social media, events management, grant-writing, book selling, libraries, teaching.


DEGREE GUIDE
