

MLCS MAJOR COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Choose between two routes:

- · Language Studies, with a focus on French, German, or Spanish
- Cross-Cultural Studies with a focus on Comparative Literature, Latin American Studies, Scandinavian Studies, or Slavic Studies

Both require 11 to 16 courses at the senior level. Courses selected must include: MLCS 210 and MLCS 410, and at least 6 credits in experiential learning earned locally or abroad.
