# An *Incomplete* List of Things to Do, See and Eat in Edmonton!

#### **About Edmonton**

Edmonton, home to 1.1 million people, is the capital city of Alberta and is known as "Canada's Festival City"! It is famous for having the largest shopping mall in North America - the West Edmonton Mall, it is the northernmost major city in North America, and its spectacular river valley is the largest continuous urban park in Canada. However, there is much more to see and do in Edmonton. Keep reading, as we guide you through just some of the amazing things our city has to offer during your visit!

#### **Orient Yourself**

*Space*: Edmonton is bifurcated by the North Saskatchewan River, and is surrounded by a deep ravine known as the "River Valley". This area constitutes the longest stretch of connected urban parkland in North America, and Edmonton has the highest amount of parkland per capita of any Canadian city; the river valley is 22 times larger than New York City's Central Park! This main "Ribbon of Green" contains a 25 km (16 mi)-long river valley park system with 11 lakes, 14 ravines, and 22 major parks, and most of the city has accessible bike and walking trail connections.

The river separates the two major sections of the city. On the south side of the river is the University of Alberta & Whyte Avenue (82<sup>nd</sup> Ave). This area has local shopping, restaurants, bars and clubs. The north side sports the downtown area which has undergone a continual process of renewal and growth since the mid-1990s. Many buildings were demolished during the oil boom, starting in the 1960s and continuing into the 1980s, to make way for office towers, condos and restaurants. The main street is Jasper Ave, the "core" of the city's nightlife is at 104<sup>th</sup> St., with the culinary & food scene located along 124 St. The newly developed ICE District and Rogers Place arena are the home of the Edmonton Oilers NHL hockey team.

*Time*: At the summer solstice (this year on June 21), Edmonton receives over seventeen hours of daylight. On average, Edmonton receives 2,345 hours of bright sunshine per year, and is one of Canada's sunniest cities (even when it gets to -40°C during the winter). This means that there are lots of extra sunlight hours for outdoor activities (it is the only city I know where you can get a 9pm tee time) – but don't forget the sunscreen.

*Getting Around*: Edmonton has a great public transit system, but most things are within easy walking distance or a short Uber / Taxi from the downtown core.



### Some Things To Do In Edmonton!

<u>Edmonton Visitor Guide</u>: A fantastic resource for visitors who have never been to the Edmonton region, and for those who have - or even one for local residents to re-discover!

<u>Events Calendar</u>: Which lists several exciting things happening in Edmonton at the time of the conference, and is constantly being updated. With Edmonton dubbed "<u>Festival</u> <u>City</u>", there's always something to celebrate!

*Farmers Markets:* For unique local foods, crafts, and products, visit one of the many farmers markets in Edmonton. The <u>Downtown Edmonton</u> Farmers Market, which is within walking distance to the hotel, is a great spot to check out a whole range of wonderful local, handmade and fresh items to take back with you.

<u>Indigenous Edmonton</u>: Immerse yourself in Indigenous culture – in their stories, cuisine, art, and creative talents. June is <u>National</u> <u>Indigenous History Month</u> in Canada! Discover the innumerable contributions made by the indigenous people of this land we stand on, and which we locals call "home".

*Foodie Paradise*: Edmonton is a food lover's paradise, with talented, local and international chefs and culinarians creating delectable dining experiences for all palates, from all regions around the world. *Discount Dining Passes* provide deals at partner establishments in Old Strathcona and Downtown, as well as at brewery partners for some delicious local craft beverages...cheers to a fantastic AIC 2022 conference everyone!

#### Get Outside

<u>*River Valley Runs and Walks*</u>: There are so many wonderful trails, scenic parks, and off beaten paths along the river to discover. Our spectacular river valley is a natural wonder waiting to be explored and enjoyed by all who visit!

<u>*Golf*</u>: The City of Edmonton operates <u>public golf courses</u> in the river valley; the long summer days let even the hardest working fit in tee time.

<u>Alberta Legislature Building</u>: Beautiful grounds surround Alberta's seat of government, and a large central fountain makes for some excellent splashing on a hot summer's day. A great place for a walk, run, picnic, or an outdoor meeting. Free tours are also available, both in person and virtually!

#### Shop Till you Drop!

<u>West Edmonton Mall</u>: Visit the WEM, the largest mall in North America, and take advantage of the low taxes and favorable exchange rate!

<u>Old Strathcona</u> (Whyte Ave between 99<sup>th</sup> and 109<sup>th</sup> St): Here you can find many independent stores ranging from designer boutiques to vintage clothes. Take the beautifully restored <u>High</u> <u>Level Bridge Streetcar</u> to make your way from downtown (109 St) straight to Old Strathcona via the more picturesque route, as you ride high above and over the North Saskatchewan river!

#### **Museum & Art Galleries**

<u>Royal Alberta Museum</u>: Explore the Royal Alberta Museum's unique and informative natural, historical, Indigenous, and local cultural exhibits and collections. It is conveniently located downtown, just past City Hall and Churchill Square, which are both also places to visit.

<u>Art Gallery of Alberta</u>: Check out this beautiful art gallery and its revolving exhibits, which feature local and renowned artists. The building design is itself constructed to reflect the spectacular waves of the Aurora Borealis - the Northern Lights.

<u>Latitude 53</u>: A contemporary artist culture centre that promotes provoking local, national and international artists. This gallery is unlike other museums or galleries; it values experimental, diverse and sustainable art. It is worth checking out!

Other independent galleries can be found throughout the city, especially along the 124 Street/Jasper Avenue corridor, known as the "gallery walk".

#### Attractions

*Fort Edmonton Park*: Visit the historic Fort Edmonton Park, for a journey of Alberta through the ages! Historical buildings, interactive interpretive characters, Indigenous heritage and cultural exhibits, and the steam train and midway rides make for interesting, and fun times.

<u>Muttart Conservatory</u>: Visit the Muttart Conservatory, visible with its glass pyramids nestled within the river valley. The Muttart houses one of Canada's largest indoor botanical collections!

<u>World Waterpark at WEM</u>: Wrap up your West Edmonton Mall visit by riding the waves in the world's largest indoor wave pool, or whizzing down one of its many waterslides!

#### Festivals & Events

It's always <u>Festival time</u> in Edmonton! The <u>Freewill Shakespeare in the Park</u> festival kicks off June 14 in the gorgeous William Hawrelak Park outdoor Heritage Amphitheater. Or head over to <u>UP on the Square</u> which takes place at Churchill Square.

Celebrate <u>National Indigenous History Month</u> in Canada, with many events taking place across the country. The Edmonton Downtown Farmers Market nearby hosts the <u>Indigenous Artist</u> <u>Market Collective</u>.

#### Theatre & Live Performances

Take in a musical, dance, symphony, improv, or dinner theatre show at one of the many <u>theatres and venues</u> sprinkled across Edmonton! Located downtown, and within walking distance of the conference is the Citadel Theatre, and the Winspear Centre, home to the <u>Edmonton Symphony Orchestra</u> (ESO).

Across the river by Old Strathcona and the U of A, are the Varscona Theatre and the Northern Alberta Jubilee Auditorium, with a wide variety of performances taking place through the year. Or you can catch dinner and a show at the Jubilations or Mayfair Dinner Theatres!

## **COFFEE SHOPS**

**TRANSCEND** - Masters of coffee since 2006, Transcend is a must-try destination for true coffee fanatics. Staff are well trained and passionate, often reciting the complicated alchemy of handcrafted coffees.

**CREDO** - Credo is a set of sibling coffee shops well-known amongst locals for their quality coffee (and London Fogs for those non-coffee folks). Each cup of Credo coffee is filled with feel-good flavour.

**ROGUE WAVE** - Rogue Wave is owned by two caffeinated Daves, yes that's right, two Daves. The roasted beans in-house make a huge difference; the coffee is earthy and smooth. Must try: Mexican hot chocolate.

#### LOCK STOCK COFFEE -

At Lock Stock, espresso is pulled with care, savoury biscuits are baked fresh and heated to order, and English muffins are fried daily for a variety of sandwiches, making them a necessary stop when in the downtown neighbourhood.

## **BRUNCH SPOTS**

**PIP** - Award-winning, and rightfully so, PIP changed the brunch scene when it made its appearance in Edmonton. Serving up a bangin' brunch every single day of the week, we wouldn't judge you if you showed up for each one. We'd highly recommend the short rib eggs benedict, or of course a classic favourite, avocado on toast.

**SUGARBOWL** - An absolute staple in Edmonton, you cannot leave Sugarbowl without trying one of their massive homemade cinnamon buns. And we really do mean massive, these things were made for sharing (unless you want to eat it all yourself, we wouldn't judge). Of course they have other amazing things on the menu, but really, try the cinnamon bun.

**OEB** - This breakfast haven may not be exclusive to Edmonton, but it's worthy of this list all the same. From oodles of different french toast varieties, to a full list of breakfast poutines (we highly recommend Soul in a Bowl. It's so good it's been registered and trademarked), you won't go wrong with whatever you pick.

CAFÉ BICYCLETTE - If breakfast with a little je-ne-sais-quoi is your jam, then checking out Café Bicyclette for your morning meal is a must. Their omelet is light, fluffy and packed with tasty ingredients like mushrooms and chopped bacon sautéed with chive butter and brie. Their bennies are a delight as well, made with ingredients that won't disappoint (like smoked salmon - yum!).

## LUNCH TO GO
