2013-14 marks the 10th anniversary of CSL at the U of A. Ten years of 'hands-on minds-on' learning was the theme for our CSLebration, which took place on April 9th.

The past year has flown by, and as we plan for the academic year ahead, we value the opportunity to reflect on our activities in 2013-14. These include our core program areas of curricular CSL, Non-Profit Board Student Internship Program, and Humanities 101 in addition to our CSL Research Group, seminar series and grants program. For example, our first student leadership grant was established—the Boardwalk Rental Communities Learning and Change Award—to provide an opportunity for students to imagine and implement a community change project. For eligible CSL instructors, we introduced the Instructor Support Program to provide matching Teaching Assistant funding. Our first working paper was co-written by panelists in our instructor seminar. We also released a preliminary report of the quantitative findings of our research into CSL student outcomes. At the same time, stories of CSL participants have been featured in our 'Faces of CSL' photo-blog.

As we recognize the significant impact of our work on students as well as communities, we look forward to the next ten years of CSL.

Here are just a few examples of the great classes that were offered and projects CSL students contributed to this year:



Spanish 405 - Exercises in Translation: Spanish into English

Instructor Odile Cisneros provides her students the opportunity to experience the practical aspects of translation and understand how their skills can have direct and practical applications locally. Students worked with Change for Children Association to translate environmental campaign documents with Nicaragua's foremost environmental organization, Centro Humboldt. Students also translated oral history interviews of the first Chilean families that came to live in Mill Woods as part of Memoria Viva Society's Mill Woods Living Local Project.

Native Studies 430 & 550 - Aboriginal Governance and Partnership Capstone & Practicum in Native Studies

These two classes taught by **instructor Shalene Jobin** both involved intensive research work with community partners: **Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation**, **Alberta Public Interest Research Group**, **GOA** - **Aboriginal Relations**, **Maskwacis Health Research Project**, **Metis Settlements Appeal Tribunal**, **Nechi Institute**, **Treaty 8**, **and Tribal Chiefs Ventures Inc.**. With focus on Aboriginal governance and partnership, projects explored a range of issues including: renewable resources development, settler relations, unequal relations of power, sex trafficking, and land claims.

Marketing 455 / 655 - Sustainability and Responsible Marketing

Teaching students to develop enhanced ability to recognize the marketing dimensions of social, environmental and organizational activity, **instructor Leo Wong** helps provide unique opportunities for Community Partners to create and evaluate a marketing plan with CSL students.

iHuman Youth Society was one of the partners that benefited from having students develop a plan for donor development.

Faculty of Medicine and Dentistry CSL

Health Advocacy and Leadership Student, Angela Han, in collaboration with the Faculty of Medicine and Dentistry, Division of Community Engagement, helped design a CSL program for medical students to explore health and social issues faced by diverse community groups and become familiar with concepts of social responsibility, community service, and advocacy as a physician. Students worked with the Africa Centre, Boyle McCauley Health Centre, Boyle Street Community Services, Chimo Youth Retreat Centre, E4C, George Spady Society, Jasper Place High School Global Cafe, Pride Centre of Edmonton, and the YMCA of Northern Alberta.

Music 365 - Introduction to Ethnomusicology (Applied Ethnomusicology and Social Responsibility)



Instructor Rana El Kadi created and delivered the university's inaugural course in "applied ethnomusicology," focusing on the role that music may play in expressing, negotiating, and mitigating political conflict, health issues, and migration in numerous geographical contexts. Students worked with the Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers Global Voices Choir and the Nuer Music Club, and several chose to continue as volunteers through the spring. Through their CSL placements, students were empowered to take on new leadership roles and were pushed to reassess their preconceived notions about race, privilege, cultural difference, and community development. The course culminated in a student showcase and community dialogue at Convocation Hall.

INSTRUCTOR SUPPORT PROGRAM

This year, CSL introduced the Instructor Support Program (ISP). The purpose of the ISP is to provide new CSL instructors or CSL instructors of larger classes (40 or more students) with matching funds to be used for a Teaching Assistant to support the service-learning component of the course.

Congratulations to Ken Caine, Faculty of Arts and Jonathan Anuik, Faculty of Education. We look forward to working with these instructors in the Fall 2014 semester!

PARTNERSHIP GRANTS

Youth Engagement through System Change

Since 2013, CSL has been working with **Dr. Yoshitaka Iwasaki of the Faculty of Extension** and community co-applicant **Catherine Broomfield of iHuman Youth Society** on a Youth Engagement through System Change project. The purpose of this project is to facilitate social change and system transformation to effectively support engagement and development of marginalized youth in the Edmonton region.

This project is the continuation and implementation of Dr. Iwasaki's work with the Community-University Partnership (CUP) and the development of a Framework for Youth Engagement. In collaboration with a Spring 2014 course, CSL 350 – Engaging Youth Labeled 'At-Risk', youth are participating in a variety of engagement sessions and the framework is being evaluated for its usefulness in facilitating social change.

Working With Kids: Factors Affecting Staff Retention in YMCA Childcare Centres

CSL has also been working with Dr. Helen Vallianatos and Dr. Alison Dunwoody of the Faculty of Arts, in partnership with YMCA Edmonton. As the largest non-profit childcare provider in Edmonton, the YMCA provides care from birth through 12 years. YMCA managers have wondered why some of these childcare centres keep their teachers for a very long time, but others do not. This is an important question because many changes in staff may affect quality of care for children.

To explore issues around staff retention, interviews will be done with staff and clients from 4 centres in Edmonton. In collaboration with a Spring 2014 course, **CSL 350 – Learning Qualitative Methods: Childcare in the Community**, students conduct participant observation to learn about what kinds of activities happen and how each centre works.

SMALL GRANTS

In 2013, we awarded three small grants to support CSL instruction: **Shalene Jobin, Faculty of Native Studies**, received a small grant to help fund an instructional designer for a pilot project of an online or mixed delivery course **NS 430**.

Russell Cobb, Faculty of Arts, received a small grant for audio recording and mixing equipment to create narrative-driven radio documentaries and podcasts in courses including LA ST 210 and LA ST 311.

Issa Kamara, Sinkunia Community Development Organization, received a small grant to help support the African youth 'Tell it like it is' initiative, which has partnered with courses **CSL 350** and **SOC 321**.

Thank you to every one who was able to come out and celebrate with us. We look forward to building our future with you!










Humanities 101 continues to deliver unique and responsive curriculum that encourages critical thinking in the everyday and inspires a passion for lifelong learning. We offer two courses at two different locations each semester. One is open to all and is held at the St. John's Institute (SJI), the other course is open to women who are residents of a second-stage women's shelter and is held at Wings of Providence.

Understanding that the Humanities 101 learners often face multiple barriers to educational opportunities, we do our best to create an open, welcoming, and encouraging learning environment. Humanities 101 recognizes that many of the learners live in poverty and therefore we continue to provide food and all supplies necessary for productive learning.

In the fall 2013 semester classrooms were full! Each semester there is a theme that runs throughout the curriculum - the fall 2013 theme was home.

At Wings we focused on the roles of women both inside and outside of the home. We explored this with various guest instructors and at the end of the semester the women made their own "homes" out of a variety of materials that represented their past, current, or imagined future relationship to the home.

At SJI the focus was looking at home through different lenses. Each week a volunteer graduate student introduced a different academic discipline and explored ideas of home through the lens of that discipline. We also finished off the semester building our own "homes" using mixed media. You can find a brochure of our "homes" on the CSL website.

In the winter 2014 semester, Humanities 101 looked a bit different from previous terms. While Lisa Prins, Humanities 101 Coordinator, was on leave, 9 graduate students stepped up to lead the program. We chose a "Meeting of the Minds" model where we met once a month around a particular topic. Each meeting was organized under the theme of "Asking Good Questions" – we wanted to explore together the questions we ask, how we ask them, and the objects and people of whom we can ask questions.

There were four meetings in total, where "Asking Good Questions" was explored from different angles. We started with the philosophical understandings of "Asking Good Questions", building to focus on media and the complicated ways it can be interpreted, questions in relation to research, and how language can enable multiple meanings.

Here is a snapshot of the impact of CSL on students and community partners. These are some of the dominant themes that emerged from the answers to our questionnaire:

Students

Valued meeting and working with different groups of people:

"[One of the most meaningful aspects of CSL was] working with a different population of people who come from very different backgrounds than me."

Enjoyed having the opportunity to help others:

"Being able to fill a knowledge gap in my partner organization and contribute useful ideas and information...
made my work feel valuable."

Community Partners

CSL students developed projects and tools that were useful to the community organization:

"The students used information we provided to develop a very sustainable marketing strategy. Their strategy is clear, concrete and reflects the current trends in this field. I hope to be using the branding...for our employment services."

Students brought useful knowledge to the organization and helped to increase its capacity:

"CSL students contributed very useful information and product ideas for our organization to work from. This has provided insightful and creative new ways to approach specific tasks."

Students benefitted the service users of the community organization:

"The seniors said they loved having the young people being part of their lives. Their gift of music was so much appreciated."

Evaluations are carried out at the end of each term with instructors, CSL students, non-CSL students and community partners.

CSL Research Group

This group forms a community of practice around research into experiential learning. We currently have 40 members, including 9 graduate students and 4 post-doctoral researchers. Our monthly meetings focus on topics of interest to members. We are organizing a CSL pre-conference day as part of the Engagement Scholarship Consortium Conference to be held in Edmonton in October 2014. It was also exciting this year to be approached by the committee planning a conference sponsored by the Canadian Alliance for Community Service-Learning to present about our Research Group since it is one of few groups of this type in a Canadian university.
