

MARTHA COOK PIPER RESEARCH PRIZE

Terms of reference and application process

This award commemorates Dr. Piper's significant contribution to the research community while Vice-President (Research) and Vice-President (Research and External Affairs) at the University of Alberta from 1993-1997. Two awards, valued at \$3,000 each, are presented annually to faculty members who enjoy a reputation for original research and who show outstanding promise conducting original research in in each of the following categories:

- 1. Business, education, fine arts, humanities, law, or social sciences
- 2. Sciences, health sciences, or engineering

Eligibility

Candidates must be within fifteen (15) years of completing a doctoral degree (or equivalent qualification). For candidates with an MD or DVM degree, the 15-year period begins after completing formal research training. To be eligible, candidates must have obtained the doctoral degree/equivalent (or completed their formal research training) on or after January 1, 2010. Candidates must also have a strong research record and demonstrate outstanding promise as a researcher.

The Office of the Vice-President (Research and Innovation) will consider extending the eligibility period for individuals who have taken leave (e.g. parental, illness, compassionate care, etc.)

Selection process

Three principal criteria for candidate assessment are:

- 1. Quality of the individual's research
- 2. Impact of their research on the advancement of the discipline; to date and in the future.
- 3. Evidence of their commitment to the principles of <u>Access, Community, and</u> Belonging (ACB) in the research program.

Teaching will not constitute part of the evaluation except for graduate teaching and supervision relevant to the candidate's research.

The award is adjudicated by a committee chaired by the Vice-President (Research and Innovation), or delegate. The committee includes one or more Associate Vice-Presidents (Research) and members from the University's research community who are suitably representative of the diversity that exists across the institution and who conduct research in the designated award categories. All adjudicators complete unconscious bias training.

The OVPRI will confirm that the selected recipients are members of good standing in their Faculty prior to notification.

Application process

Each candidate is entitled to submit one application per year.

The following information must be submitted, in the following order, as part of the application:

- Statement of the category in which the application is to be considered. For interdisciplinary researchers, please select the category that most closely aligns with your research focus and provide rationale for the category choice.
 - o Business, education, fine arts, humanities, law, or social sciences
 - Sciences, health sciences, or engineering

Note: The selection committee reserves the right to change the category for consideration.

- One-page statement of how the candidate's research program incorporates the
 principles of <u>Access, Community, and Belonging</u>. Access ensures all have the
 opportunities to succeed and flourish, by dismantling barriers. Community
 emphasizes connection and shared purpose. Belonging creates an environment
 where individuals feel seen, valued, and supported.
- Two-page summary, for a multidisciplinary audience, of the candidate's three most important publications, creative works and/or scholarly contributions. In the summary, explain your choice of venues for the dissemination of research results. In addition to the more traditional peer-reviewed journals, you may also include books, chapters of books, articles, monographs, memoirs, special papers, reviews, conference/symposia proceedings and abstracts, patents, creative or artistic works, government publications, book reviews by the candidate or published reviews of their work, research reports, papers presented at scholarly meetings or conferences, and other forms of written scholarly expression, including participation in public discourse and debate, which constitute a contribution to research. DO NOT include copies of the publications, creative works and/or scholarly contributions with the application package.
- Letter of support (maximum 2 pages) from an academic or community referee
 that highlights the candidate's research impact. Research impact is the
 demonstrable contribution of research processes and outputs to scholarship and
 society. See Research Impact Definition for more information.
- Letter of support (maximum 2 pages) from an external academic referee in the candidate's field of research. Referee should be an expert in the field of research from outside the University with no close collegial or trainee link to the candidate. Letters should address the candidate's suitability in terms of

the criteria for the award and not be a reiteration of their CV. The letter should also include a brief biography of the referee for the selection committee's information (may be included as a separate page).

The University of Alberta will receive and maintain letters of support in confidence, except under limited and specific circumstances.
