Team-up for lung health: A collaborative approach to lung cancer and COPD risk assessment Pearls for Practice

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Key Messages

- COPD is responsible for the highest number of patient hospitalizations and is the sixth leading cause of death in Alberta.
- COPD is commonly underdiagnosed and costs the healthcare system an estimated \$1.5 billion annually
- The Canadian Lung Health test increases pretest probability. If YES to any of the questions, patient should be sent for screening spirometry.

Smoker or ex-smoker who is >40 years old and answers "yes" to any one question below:

Canadian lung health test

- Do you cough regularly?
- Do you cough up phlegm regularly?
- Do even simple chores make you short of breath?
- Do you wheeze when you exert yourself, or at night?
- Do you get frequent colds that persist longer than those of other people you know?

Spirometry recommended

Lung cancer screening can save your life Getting screened can lower your risk of dying



- Lung Cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in Alberta.
- <u>Screening for lung cancer can save lives</u>. The eligibility criteria for referral to the Alberta Lung Cancer Screening Program (ALCSP) are:
 - 50 to 74 years of age
 - Current or ex-smoker
 - At least 1.5% risk of lung cancer over 6 years (The ALCSP uses a risk-based approach to lung cancer screening. Upon receipt of referral, the program will calculate the patient's individual risk. Patients with a lung cancer risk of ≥1.5% over 6 years will require screening using low dose Computed Tomography)
- Have a family physician or other primary care provider, such as a nurse practitioner
- A Team based approach to identifying patients at risk for lung cancer and COPD using available tools can improve patient outcomes.
